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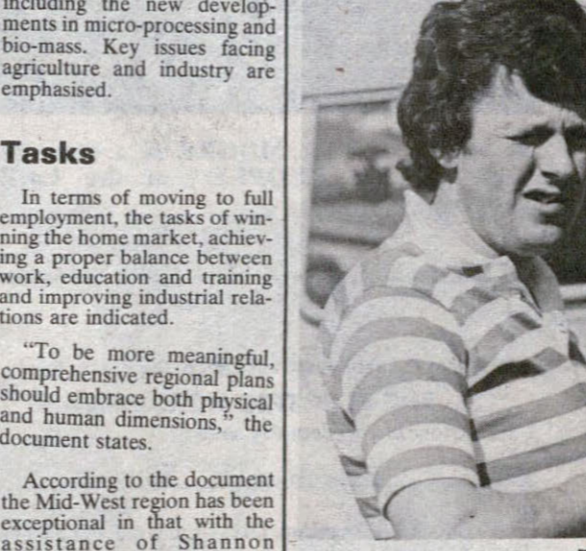
Scheme starts

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Old Limerick unfolded for visitors
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The ceremonies were preceded by a Mass celebrated at the Reparation Convent, Laurel Hill Avenue.
Tributes in the form of memorial plaques were paid to the late J. C. Duggan and to the Jones family, all of whom were dedicated members of the St. Michael's Troop.
Mr. Jim O'Dwyer, Diocesan Chairman of the Scout movement, praised both Mr. Duggan and the Jones family for the tremendous amount of work they put into the unit.
Mr. O'Dwyer described Joe Duggan as being a truly "great scout who gave his time and energy and knowledge freely to the scouts". Mr. Duggan was made Diocesan Commissioner in the mid '50s and from the start he encouraged the training of leaders and the extension of scouting all over the diocese.
Mr. O'Dwyer said of the Jones family: "Seldom has a family given so many of its members to one organisation and is thus right and fitting that they be honoured in this way". Mick Harry, Joe Paddy and Stephen were all members at one stage or another. It was the Jones brothers who were responsible for the founding of Duggan House when it was financially impossible to maintain their premises in Hart-stone Street.
Mr. Miriam Duggan, daughter of the late J. C. Duggan, thanked St. Michael's for honouring her father in this way. Mr. Duggan's widow was also present. Mr. Bill Jones thanked the Unit for the tribute paid to his family, also saying that his brothers would "approve and be proud".
Mr. Tom Frawley was also honoured at the ceremony when he was awarded the "medal of merit" for his work within the unit, both as a treasurer and secretary. His award was presented to him by the current secretary, Mrs. Mary Murtagh.
An inscribed silver watch was presented to Carl Dolan, who has been unit leader with the troop for many years. The watch was a token of "the trojan work and unflinching dedication he has shown over the years".
After the presentations were made, refreshments were served, and many ex-scouts who had not seen each other in a number of years had a chance to renew old friendships.

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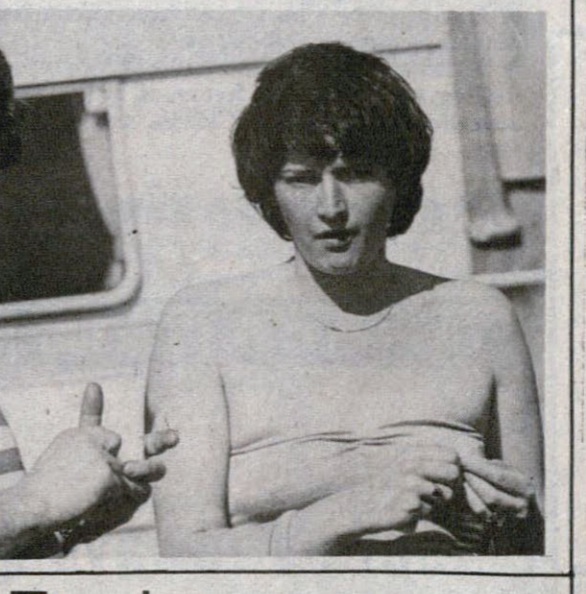
